7	SERGEANT MARTINEZ: Good morning, and welcome to
8	today's remote New York City Council Hearing of the
9	Committee on Rules, Privileges, and Elections. At
10	this time, would all panelist please turn on their
11	video? To minimize disruptions, please silence your
12	electronic devices. And, if you wish to submit
13	testimony, you may do so via email at
14	testimony@council.nyc.gov. Once and again, that is
15	testimony@council.nyc.gov. Thank you for your
16	cooperation. We are ready to begin.
17	CHAIRPERSON KOSLOWITZ: Thank you. Good morning,
18	and welcome to the Committee on Rules, Privileges,
19	and Elections. My name is Karen Koslowitz, and I am
20	chair of this committee.
21	Before we begin this hearing, I would like to
22	introduce the council members of this committee who
23	have joined us today: Minority Leader Steven Matteo,
24	Council Member Adrienne Adams, Council Member
25	Margaret Chin, Council Member Keith Powers, Council
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 Member Deborah Rose, Council Member Paul Vallone,
 (BACKGROUND NOISE 01:32) and is Mark Treyger with us?
 Alright, I don't see (BACKGROUND NOISE 01:41)...
 Sorry, that was my house phone. Mark Treyger join
 us, or he's not... I guess not. Okay, and we'll be
 joined by The Speaker.

8 I would also like to acknowledge Rules Committee 9 Counsel Lance Polivy and the staff members of the 10 council's investigative unit, Chuck Davis Chief 11 Compliance officer, and investigators Andre Johnson -12 Brown, Alicia Vesele, Desirée Robinson, and Ramses 13 (INAUDIBLE 2:34).

14 Today the Rules Committee will consider the 15 nomination of Matthew Schneid for appointment to the 16 Environmental Control Board.

17 If the council gives its advice and consent, Mr. 18 Schneid, a Manhattan resident, will fill a vacancy on 19 the Environmental Control Board as a person with a 20 background and experience in real estate. He would 21 complete the remainder of a four year term that 22 expires on NOVEMBER 24, 2021.

Within the New York City office of the
administrative trials hearings, there is an
Environmental Control Board that adjudicates notices

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 of violations issued by various city agencies
 including departments of Environmental Protection,
 Police, Sanitation, Health and Mental Hygiene, Fire
 and Buildings.

ECB has the power to render decisions and orders and to impose civil penalties under law, and they apply to a court of common jurisdiction for informant of any decision, order, or subpoena that it issues.

Among the provisions of law enforced by ECB are 10 those relating to the cleanliness of city streets, 11 the disposal of waste, the provision of a pure 12 wholesome and adequate supply of water, the 13 14 prevention of air, water, and noise pollution, the 15 regulation of street peddling, and the city responds 16 to emergencies caused by releases or threatened 17 releases of hazardous substances.

ECB consists of the commissioners of The Department of Environmental Protections, Sanitation, Health and Mental Hygiene, Buildings, Police, Fire, and The Chief Administrative floor Judge of Oath, as well as six persons appointed by the mayor with the advising consent of the council.

24 The Chief Administrative Judge of Oath serves as25 Chair of ECB. Within its appropriation, ECB may

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 appoint and Executive Director and six hearing
 officers, including non-salaried hearing officers and
 other employees as it finds necessary to properly
 perform its duties.

6 Members of the agency commissions may not be 7 employed by the city. Five of the six non-commission 8 members must possess broad, general background and 9 experience; one in each of the following areas: Air 10 Pollution Control, Water Pollution Control, Noise 11 Pollution Control, and Real Estate or Business.

12 The sixth non-commissioned member represents the 13 general public.

Members, other than the agency commissioners, are compensated and receive a \$175.10 per diem when performing the work ECB. Member terms are for four years. I want to welcome Mr. Schneid and, we're gonna swear you in.

19 COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Good morning, Mr. Schneid, 20 will you please raise your right hand? Do you swear 21 to tell the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but 22 the truth?

23 MATTHEW SCHNEID: I do.

24 CHAIRPERSON KOSLOWITZ: Mr. Schneid, do you have 25 an opening statement?

1 COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 7 MATTHEW SCHNEID: I do. 2 CHAIRPERSON KOSLOWITZ: Okay? 3 MATTHEW SCHNEID: Okay, thank you so much. Madam 4 Chairwoman, members of the committee, thank you for 5 inviting me today and for considering my appointment 6 7 for this important position. I have been a resident of the city for over 15 8 years, and I'm honored, once again, to have the 9 opportunity to make a public service contribution. 10 I believe that the ECB has an important function 11 in city life in assisting in the enforcement of 12 regulations designed to ensure our city is a safe 13 place to live and work. 14 15 Emerging from this COVID-19 crisis, now more than 16 ever, we have to be keen in making sure that those of 17 us who live and work in the city are safe, but also 18 understand the challenges, both to our safety and financially, that COVID-19 has wrought. 19 I started my public service with the city as a 20 member of Community Board Five Manhattan, and as the 21 22 board's representative to the diamond district, 23 business improvement district. During my approximate eight years on the community board, I greatly enjoyed 24 my service to the public, and saw the benefits of 25

1 COMMITTEE ON RULES, PRIVILEGES AND ELECTIONS 8 2 collaboration with the public, and transparency with issues pending before the community board. 3

It was partly through my experience on the 4 community board that I decided to pursue a career as 5 a lawyer and particularly focus on real estate, 6 7 because I became fascinated by the real estate issues confronting the community board, and wanted to learn 8 more and spend my time on real estate issues 9 10 professionally.

For more than ten years now, I've been a real 11 estate lawyer, mostly representing owners, operators, 12 investors, and developers in the buying, selling, 13 investing, and financing of real estate, as well as 14 15 representing both landlords and tenants in lease 16 negations.

17 Through my work, I've been involved in 18 transactions of all sizes, and greatly enjoyed the ability of my clients to impact the city in a 19 positive manner, whether through providing housing 20 for our citizens or working to open new retail 21 22 businesses and restaurants, or serving as office 23 space for our city's businesses.

In my professional career, I've come to 24 25 understand the opportunities and challenges of owning

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 and maintaining real estate in order to employ my
 experience in the service of the public.

I hope my knowledge of complicated real estate
transactions will provide insight to address the
variety of matters that are presented before the
Environmental Control Board.

8 Now, as a potential board member of ECB, my goal 9 will be to fairly address the issues presented before 10 the ECB in oath, that all parties are treated fairly 11 and with respect, and have the ability to be properly 12 heard.

13 Thank you very much for my consideration of my 14 nomination for the ECB. I'm happy to answer any 15 questions.

16 CHAIRPERSON KOSLOWITZ: Okay, I gonna open in to 17 questions. And, I have two questions. Uhm, you 18 would... (CROSS-TALK 8:42)

MATTHEW SCHNEID: Sure.

20 CHAIRPERSON KOSLOWITZ: You were nominated to 21 fill the position of someone with a broad, general 22 background and inexperience in the field of real 23 estate, which you mentioned. How does (BACKGROUND 24 NOISE 8:53) your experience in real estate enhance 25 the ECB in its ability to fulfil its mission?

2	MATTHEW SCHNEID: Sure, as I mentioned, for over
3	ten years I've been a real estate lawyer representing
4	all parties in real trade in New York City. And, the
5	ECB, on a regular basis, has oversight in to issues
6	related to real estate in adjudicating the matters.
7	So, I think it's important that someone with my
8	background, who works with real estate owners and
9	operators, landlords and tenants, know Has
10	Is on the board and has insight to provide guidance
11	when that guidance is required. However, for myself,
12	I think I'm bringing impartiality and fairness to
13	these proceedings I hope to bring.
14	CHAIRPERSON KOSLOWITZ: Okay, and do you have any
15	experience with other areas over which ECB has
16	jurisdiction, such as air and water pollution, noise
17	pollution, fire safety, street cleanliness, hazardous
18	substances, street peddling, use of parks, property
19	and landmark, and historic areas?
20	MATTHEW SCHNEID: Sure, yeah, a lot of
21	different Of those areas are implicated through
22	my work as a real estate lawyer. Just, for example,
23	obviously many of the buildings in the city are
24	landmarked. So, if that's an issue for a building
25	we're buying or selling or leasing, or redesigning,

2	that would be implicated. When you have When you
3	buy or sell a building, or lease a building, you want
4	to make sure that the fire safety protocols are in
5	place. So, all these different items interact, you
6	know, with real estate and with my involvement.
7	Separately, on a volunteer basis when I was on
8	the community board, you know, we also dealt with a
9	lot of those issues. I thought that was a
10	fascinating experience. I really enjoyed it. And,
11	it's one of the reasons that As I mentioned
12	earlier, propelled me to go to law school and work in
13	real estate. So, I have some of that experience as
14	well.
15	CHAIRPERSON KOSLOWITZ: Okay, thank you. And, I
16	see we've been joined by Council Member Mark Treyger.
17	We'll open the floor to anyone, my Of my
18	colleagues who would have any questions.
19	Seeing none
20	COMMITTEE COUNSEL: Council Member Powers has a
21	question.
22	CHAIRPERSON KOSLOWITZ: Oh, okay. Oh, I see,
23	okay.
24	COUNCIL MEMBER POWERS: Thank you Council Member
25	Koslowitz. And, Mr. Schneid, nice to meet you. I am

2	always supportive of people from Community Board Five
3	and The Diamond District BID. You know, a great
4	council member, I'd like to say so myself.
5	(BACKGROUND NOISE 11:10) (<u>INAUDIBLE 11:11</u>) which
6	is, uhm, I think this is on your maybe your
7	questionnaire as well. But, the EC there's a
8	report from The Department of Investigations a few
9	months ago at the ECB, uhm, having issues when it's
10	coming to collecting actual and resolving fines
11	and issues. I think it totaled about a billion
12	dollars of fines that had been uncollected due to
13	poor effort or poor management or poor ability
14	(<u>INAUDIBLE 11:37</u>) to that.
15	Have you taken a look at that issue at all? I'm
16	wondering if you have any ideas of how to fix that.
17	MATTHEW SCHNEID: Yeah, I spoke with the the
18	staff with the ECB about this matter. I think
19	everyone agrees it's an important issue that, once we
20	have an adjudication, that the fines are collected.
21	I think from an enforcement perspective, you know,
22	it's really ECB's role to have adjudication, but then
23	they pass over the enforcement to other agencies.
24	So, I think from that perspective, those questions
25	are probably best handled by those agencies that do

2	the enforcement. But, I certainly agree if there's
3	more efficient ways to collect the money, that
4	(INAUDIBLE 12:14) the goal. Or they go into have an
5	adjudication, to give issue a violation of fine
6	not collected, is certainly not ideal.
7	COUNCIL MEMBER POWERS: Okay. Thank you Thank
8	you, Chair.
9	CHAIRPERSON KOSLOWITZ: Okay. I'll open the floor
10	now to the public if anybody has any questions.
