SPEAKER JOHNSON: Okay, good afternoon and welcome to our August stated meeting. As we approach the end of the summer, I hope everyone is staying safe in this extreme heat.

MEMBER OF PUBLIC: [INAUDIBLE 17:06-18:52].

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Okay, I'm going to say that if we have any more outbursts from the mezzanine area, we're going to have to clear the entire balcony so we can proceed with our Stated meeting.

So, as we approach the end of summer, I hope everyone is staying safe in this extreme heat.

First, I would like to extend my congratulations to our new Governor Kathy Hochul and our new Lieutenant Governor Brian Benjamin. The Council is eager to support our new leaders and confident that their years of experience serving New Yorkers will help lead us to better days ahead. [CROWD CLAPPING 19:22].

Yes, our city and state face some big challenges including our continued fight against COVID-19. As of yesterday, 33,763 New Yorkers have died from

COVID-19. Hopefully this week's FDA approval of the Pfizer vaccine will encourage more New Yorkers to get vaccinated. The health and recovery of our city depends on more people getting vaccinated. As I do at every stated meeting, I want to remember the lives of those that we lost to 911 related illnesses. On August 14<sup>th</sup>, retired NYPD Detective Sergeant Chris Tully was lost. He was 52-years-old.

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I also want to acknowledge those who died while on the job here in New York City. On July 30<sup>th</sup>, Pedicab Driver Ibrokhim Azizov was killed after a drive hit his vehicle in Midtown Manhattan. He was 24-years-old.

On Monday, August 23<sup>rd</sup>, Mario Gonzalez, a mechanic was fatally shot on the upper east side in an auto repair shop. My prayers are with their loved ones and their families during this extremely difficult time.

This month, we also mourn the death of Richard Trumka, President of the twelve and a half million member labor federation, the AFL-CIO. He was a terrific leader for America's working class and a strong advocate for social and economic justice. He died on August 5<sup>th</sup> at the age of 72. On August 12<sup>th</sup>,

we also lost New York Supreme Court Justice Frank

Torres. Justice Torres worked tirelessly to get more

Hispanic representation on the bench. He was 93years-old. Let us rise and pause for a moment of

silence for Chris Tully, Ibrokhim Azizov, Mario

Gonzalez, Richard Trumka, Justice Torres and all of
those other lives that we've lost. [SILENCE 21:3821:50]. Thank you.

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Before we move into our agenda for the day, I want to congratulate Andrea Vazquez, our Deputy Director of the Legislative Division. She and her husband Patrick are celebrating the birth of their new baby girl Francesca, who was born on August 2<sup>nd</sup>. The whole family is doing well and we wanted to congratulate her.

Now, let's dive into our agenda today. Out of the Finance Committee, we will be voting on a transparency resolution and a full 40 year Article 11 property tax exemption for 310 East 4<sup>th</sup> Street in Council Member Carlina Rivera's district to support the preservation of 16 units of affordable housing. We will be voting on the following Land Use items: The Landmarks Preservation Commissions designation of Holyrood Episcopal Church Iglesia Santa Cruz, in

Two HPD UDAAP Article XI applications that will facilitate the development of 132 affordable units in Council Member Diana Ayala, Vanessa Gibson and Darma Diaz's districts and Beach 67<sup>th</sup> Street rezoning as modified will facilitate the development of a nine story building with 84 affordable units for seniors and 11 story school, the existing church will remain on the site and this is in Council Member Brooks-Powers's district.

133 Beach 116<sup>th</sup> Street overlay rezoning will facilitate the commercial overlay that will increase the variety of local retail uses within a newly constructed as of right development in Council Member Eric Ulrich's district.

Moving on to our legislative agenda from the Committee of Consumer Affairs. Today, we're voting

on Introduction Number 1622-A, sponsored by Council Member Margaret Chin. This bill will update the city's consumer protection law, so that it continues to be an effective enforcement tool against deceptive business practices. The consumer protection law is a landmark piece of legislation that has kept unfair, false and misleading business dealings in check for over a decade.

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Introduction 1622-A would update the laws current penalty amounts, which have not been updated since 1969 to make them more appropriate to businesses operating in 2021, raising the penalties ensure that they remain effective, so that business can't simply internalize the cost. The bill would also make explicit the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection can seek penalties for each day in which a business has engaged in deceptive conduct. It could also base penalties on the number of consumers reached by a deceptive practice if an individual who engaged the deceptive business practice knew or should have known the practice was deceptive.

Protections like this are especially important today when digital communications can be brought simultaneously to millions of people. Additionally,

it would also clarify the Department has the power to combat online deceptive practices and defines as deceptive to failure of a business to provide translations of its documents if the transaction was conducted predominantly in a language other than English.

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This bill would also empower the city to issue subpoenas to enforce the Consumer Protection Law and furthermore, this bill would make some technical and clean up amendments relating to Local Law 80 of 2021, which the Council passed last month. Local Law 80 was a large undertaking that provides wide ranging civil penalty relief and some other substantive relief aimed at small businesses. And from the staff, I want to thank Stephanie Jones and Janita John.

The next bill comes of our Committee on environmental protection, Introduction Number 2283-A sponsored by Council Member Helen Rosenthal. It will require the New York City Housing Authority report to the Office of Long Term Planning and sustainability, the amount of greenhouse gas emissions for the portfolio of buildings owned or operated by NYCHA by December 1, 2022, and no later than December 1<sup>st</sup>

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 25 thereafter for the prior calendar year. This bill is aimed at trying to provide transparency to NYCHA operations and help reduce greenhouse gas emissions in New York City.

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Under this legislation, the Mayor shall include in the annual report of green building standards, the amount of greenhouse gas emissions from capital projects involving buildings that are owned or operated by NYCHA. And from the staff, I want to thank Samara Swanston, Nadia Johnson and Ricki Chowla(SP?).

Moving on from the Committee on Transportation, we're voting on Introduction Number 1811-A sponsored by Council Member Keith Powers. Introduction 1811-A will create a theatre district zone around Time Square in Manhattan, where the Department of Transportation would redesign sidewalks to facilitate the safe travel of pedestrians, commercial activity such as solicitation carried out by costume characters, CD sellers and others engaged in commercial activity on the sidewalks around Time Square presents a significant problem for the safe flow of pedestrians through one of the city's most congested neighborhoods.

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Sidewalks and subway entrances are often

obstructed in entering or exiting theatres, offices,

restaurants and other establishments can be

difficult. This bill would expand upon the

successful strategies used by the Department of

Transportation in the Time Square Pedestrian Plaza

program by implementing them on neighboring streets

with a newly created theatre zone.

The bill would mandate that DOT create pedestrian flow zones that would allow for the safe passage of pedestrians where necessary to accommodate the demand for pedestrian space and designated activity zones that maintain space for commercial activity. And from the staff, I want to thank Elliott Lynn and Jessica Steinberg Albin.

Today, we're also voting on Introduction Number 1209-A from the Committee on Criminal Justice, it's sponsored by Council Member Helen Rosenthal. There are a number of pregnant individuals incarcerated in city jails and the women's facility on Rikers Island has a nursery in which pregnant individuals and those with infants are housed.

Introduction Number 1209-A will require the Department of Corrections to retain an organization

to provide doula services during labor and delivery as well as doula programming twice a week, including labor and birth education, breastfeeding techniques and infant care. The Department of Correction would be required to issue a report every six months regarding the delivery of doula services. This bill will also create a working group to review relevant reports and discuss ways to improve communication, collaboration and efficiency related to pregnant individuals who are in custody. And I want to thank from the staff, Agatha Mavropoulos.

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Next, we have three bills out of our Committee on General Welfare. First up, Introduction Number 1483-A, sponsored by Council Member Stephen Levin, the Chair of the Committee. Will require the Department of Homeless Services to develop a plan to accommodate pets of homeless individuals and families with the objective of allowing homeless pet owners to keep their pets.

Such plan would include for example, the steps
the Department of Homeless Services can take to
prioritize the acquisition of facilities that will
permit homeless pet owners to keep their pets, as
well as identify existing providers that will permit

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 28 homeless pet owners to keep their pets. There are models across the country for successfully cosheltering humans with their animals, yet the Department of Homeless Services Shelters do not currently accommodate pets.

Pet owners who seek shelter services face the difficult problem of finding temporary pet care solutions, surrendering their pets to an animal shelter or foregoing shelter services all together. Additionally, the bill would require the Department of Homeless Services submit a plan to the speaker of the Council no later than 180 days after the effective date of this bill. And from the staff, I want to thank Aminta Kilawan.

The second bill, Introduction 1484-A also by
Chair Levin, will require the Department of Homeless
Services to post information on its website regarding
the process for having a pet designated as an
emotional support animal. The agency must report
every three months information on how many
individuals and families applied for shelter and
reported they had a pet as well as the placement of
disposition of pets that belong to people who enter

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STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 29 homeless shelters and again, I want to thank Aminta Kilawan.

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And the third bill from the Committee on General Welfare will require the Department of Social Services to Deliver survivor centered response to complaints of sexual assault or harassment made by a client or staff of the Department of Social Services or Department of Homeless Services provider.

Under Introduction Number 2284-A sponsored by Council Member Helen Rosenthal, the Department of Social Services will be required to offer sexual assault and harassment resources to each survivor, follow-up with each survivor as appropriate and review each complaint to access next steps.

The bill require the office to end domestic and gender-based violence to develop a survivor resources guide, to provide the guide to the Department of Social Services. This agency will be required to post a survivor guide and other training resources on its website and make such materials available to contracted providers.

On February 7, 2021, the New York Times released an investigative report in the dealings of Victor Rivera. The CEO of Bronx Parent Housing Network, a

city-owned contract, a city contracted shelter provider. The Times found that Mr. Rivera had sexually harassed and assaulted ten women, including former employees and women staying in the shelter.

In addition, the bill will further require the Department of Social Services to review whether a provider has entered a settlement in response to a complaint or their actions taken in response to complaints.

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The city agency will be required to submit an annual report to the Speaker of the Council and any steps taken to establish procedures pursuant to this bill and again, I want to thank Aminta Kilawan for her work on that bill. Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Council has taken several steps to help restaurants and regulate third party food delivery services in our city. Today, we continue that effort.

Introduction Number 1897-A, sponsored by Council Member Mark Gjonaj will require third party food delivery services to obtain a license in order to do business in the city. The licensing scheme will contain permanent language related to regulations that Council passed during the pandemic. The third

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 31 party food delivery services will be required to apply for a license with the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection every two years for a fee of \$200. From the staff, I want to thank Stephanie Jones and Noah Mexler(SP?).

And finally, Preconsidered Introduction Number 2390, sponsored by Council Members Francisco Moya and Mark Gjonaj, the Chair of the Small Business Committee will permanently and unconditionally extend the cap set forth in the Council's previous legislation with some enhancements. prohibits delivery platforms from charging restaurants more than 15 percent per order for delivery and more than five percent per order for all other fees. It would prohibit the services from charging more than three percent per order for transaction fees, typically credit card fees, except that it would allow for a higher charge if the third party food delivery service could provide proof upon request to both the Department of Consumer and Worker Protection and the relevant food service establishment that such higher fee reflects a pass through charge imposed by a credit card company.

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Before the Council passed Local Laws 52 and 88 of 2020 and Introduction Number 2359-A which regulated third party food delivery service commission fees, the services could charge restaurant commission's fees as high as 30 percent or more for each order placed through their website. The average restaurant profit margin is said to be somewhere between two and six percent. From the staff, again, I want to thank Stephanie Jones and Noah Mexler.

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That concludes today's legislative agenda and with that, I turn it back to you Council Member Cornegy, thank you for presiding today.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you Speaker

Johnson. We will now move into discussion of General

Orders. I would like to first recognize Council

Member Rosenthal followed by Council Member Powers.

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Thank you so much.

Uh, what are Council Member Cornegy, Assistant

Majority Leader? I am so proud to see you up there

though, I'll tell you that.

Uhm, I want to thank the Speaker and the Speakers office on two bills in particular that I'd like to mention now. We're passing a bill to strengthen Local Law 97, which the City Council passed in 2019

and applied rigorous standards to privately own buildings in order to address climate change.

However, the law did not apply to NYCHA buildings, nor did it require that the city consider greenhouse gas emissions for proposed capital projects. This law would now require that the city meet the same rigorous standards that private buildings have to meet in order to achieve our climate goals. And what I'd like to point out most importantly is that 70 percent of climate emissions in the city are due to buildings. So, addressing these and holding the city's feet to the fire is critical.

Secondly, I want to mention Local Law, sorry,
Intro. 2284, which was introduced after Victor Rivera
was identified as having sexually harassed and
assaulted his own staff and clients and the city's
response was to send those survivors around in
circles. None of the responses were trauma informed
or survivor centric. So, for the first time, we are
legislating that the city come up with [BELL RINGS].
May I continue for just a half a minute?

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Please continue and bring your comments to a close quickly.

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COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Thank you. This requires the city to have materials that they will post in the shelters as well as have these materials to give to any survivor who reaches out to the city and requires that those survivors get — are told about the services that they need in order to deal with the trauma that they have endured. I just want to thank the legislative staff and my staff and of course the Speaker's office for their help in passing these bills.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you Council Member Rosenthal. Council Member Powers followed by Council Member Menchaca.

afternoon. Nice to see everyone in person. I'm speaking here today on a bill that I've introduced and we are voting on today, Intro. 1811, which updates existing regulations to ensure the original attentive legislation was passed in 2016 and to codify ambiguities about pedestrian activity and activity in Time Square. This bill updates a 2016 law that the New York City Council passed, many folks were here for that vote.

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2 As people might know, currently the regulations 3 dictate where pedestrian activity should take place and where commercial activity should take place. 4 5 We're taking steps to strengthen that law today and also make sure that we're living up to its original 6 intention. As the city prepares to welcome back 8 throngs of tourists and if you've been to Time Square you're starting to see people come back, which is Intro. 1811 will improve that pedestrian 10 good news. 11 experience for all individuals who are traveling or

visiting Time Square.

Last month 300,000 pedestrians walked through
Time Square, more than a 30 percent increase from two
months prior. So, this is an opportunity to make
sure that those regulations that were put in 2016 are
meeting their goal and they are welcoming people back
with real opportunities to enjoy Time Square and have
pedestrian space in there.

We will be voting on that bill today, so I appreciate the support of all of my colleagues and those who have co-sponsored legislation and would of course ask for your support here today. I also want to welcome and thank the Time Square Alliance and the Street Vendor Project as well for their support of

And of course want to thank my neighbor and the person I split Time Square with, Speaker Corey Johnson, Jason Goldman and all the staff here for helping to support and pass this necessary piece of legislation. And of course, I would recognize my predecessor who is not here Dan Garodnick(SP?) who worked very hard in 2016 to put that really reasonable and thoughtful plan in place, which we are going to update and modernize.

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So, with that, I would ask for your support today and I look forward to voting on it. Thank so much.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you Council Member Powers. We will end today's General Orders portion of the Stated Meeting with Carlos Menchaca.

COUNCIL MEMBER MENCHACA: Hello. It's like, if I could rap, I'll rap for you Steve Levin. Thank you. I am going to speak on a bill that my colleague just spoke on and I just want to kind of do justice to a little complicated and tense moment that this is causing, but Council Member Powers has introduced and is wanting us to all pass 1811 and I want to thank him for the work. He represents a community that includes Time Square and Time Square is an amenity for not just the whole city but really the whole

world. And so, I want to just thank him for holding that. His conversations with the advocates and the Alliance, the Time Square Alliance has been really strong and amazing. But I also understand that we are in a moment where violence and shootings have erupted in Time Square, really requiring us all to review it and to support the Council Member and the advocates.

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Un my conversations today, because I will admit that I only started working on this today. I have asked for the NYPD report about what's happening in Time Square. They had a unit that was linguistically appropriate for characters and the vendors that I understand was removed during COVID. I've asked for the NYPD to consider bringing that back to ensure that we are communicating directly to these vendors that are immigrants. It's important because the changes that we are talking about today are supposed to be positive but we understand that when communication breaks down, bad things happen.

I understand that — the Mayor's Office told me that they are considering this and supportive of it but I think we should get it in writing. So, because of all of this and we weren't really being able to

stated Meeting of the New York City Council 38 talk about this in conference because our conferences are divided; and which you should all ask Jason to get us all back into a room as soon as possible. And as the Chair of the Immigration Committee, I'm going to be voting no on this bill, so that we can continue to really ensure that the immigrant voices are heard [BELL RINGS] and that we can ensure that language access is maximized as we make changes that are going to impact immigrants. These issues are often forgotten in these conversations —

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COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Council Member Menchaca, can you please bring your comments to a close please.

COUNCIL MEMBER MENCHACA: When they need to be at the front of the conversation. So, I'll be voting no on 1811, which I'll vote on next. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you Council Member Menchaca. We have now extended the list to add Council Member Yeger followed by Council Member Brooks-Powers.

COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Thank you Mr. President.

Uhm, I rise on Introduction 1622 extensively bearing the name that it is designed to combat deceptive business practices and I think if anything uh, it's the title of the bill that is deceptive. What this

STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 39 bill really does is it raises fines on small businesses. Now, you don't have to believe me, just look at the bill. There are fines in there were \$50 are going to be \$350. There are fines in there that are \$350 that are going to be \$2,500 as much as.

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Now, obviously, we don't want our city's businesses to engage in deceptive business practices but passing this bill requires trust. It requires us to trust the Department of Consumer Affairs won't weaponize our statute. It won't monetize our statute to terrorize the small businesses of New York. you believe that as things are today, the Department of Consumer Affairs doesn't treat small businesses like a piggybank. Like an ATM machine and run around with their quota warriors and their ticket books issuing summonses right and left because something is not in the right place or the right thing is in the wrong place or the wrong thing is in the right place or there is a sign that may be isn't there or is there or shouldn't be there or should be there. Then, you're not living in the same city I am because that's what I see.

I see it every single day. The Department of Consumer Affairs terrorizes the small business of New

York City. This bill will give them the ammunition to continue doing it in a terrible way. So, I urge you to please vote no on this bill. Now, I want to say that this bill includes some good things, which is why Albany has developed a term for a bill like this. It's called the Big Ugly. It's when we throw in some good stuff into a terrible bill and then you want to feel bad about voting no on this bill because well, it has some good things and we don't want to vote no on it.

We can bring the good things up in a separate bill and we ought to. There ought to be a regulatory scheme for laundries. Of course. There ought to be clean-ups of previous bills, of course but raising the fines on small businesses [BELL RINGS] in this environment is the wrong thing to do and I urge everybody to please vote no. Thank you very much Mr. President.

extensive, an exhaustive process of reducing fines in

New York City for small business. Given an option to

small businesses time to comply before we fine them

with a penalty. And this was a milestone in the City

of New York. We just did an amnesty bill to reduce

these fines during COVID and older violations that

were not paid to give our businesses a chance.

For some of the points that were already mentioned, this is regressing. An increase in fines without giving our small businesses the ability to cure is not an answer or a solution. And coupling it with the responsibility of having to provide contracts in up to ten languages, if the language was marketed in any other language but English is going to be a nightmare for our small businesses. 80 percent of small businesses in New York City employ less than 20 employees. They do not have the wear

with all or the ability to comply with these regulations. Here we are sending another mixed message. We are here to help and support but ultimately, this body is the cause of most of the issues that our small businesses are facing with and why it's so difficult to operate New York City.

So, I want to ask my colleagues to consider amending this bill. Allowing for a provision of cure before fining. Thank you and with that, I'll be voting no on 1622.

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In March of this year, one in five scheduled doctors visits did not happen. It was a total of 12,914 in all. We want this legislation to be successful and we must be vigilant and watching the growing shortage and the impact on healthcare, particularly to women on Rikers Island. With that, I do vote aye.

With this bill, we are limiting without expiration the fees charged to food service establishments by third party food delivery services.

This bill would also require a report to be submitted to the Mayor and the Speaker of the City Council every two years, recommending the maintenance or adjustment of the bills cap on fees, by looking at factors such as the effect of the cap on the third party food industry services and the food service establishments, whether the cap effects delivery workers wages and workers conditions. The products they provide by the third party food delivery services for listing, processing and marketing and figures such as the number of complaints and violations that total the number of penalties that are required at these businesses.

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Businesses also should not be pressured into accepting exorbitant fees in order to remain viable and competitive. This bill is one example of how we stand with businesses and its workers in one of the greatest city's in the world and I want to take this opportunity to thank the Speaker, Jason Goldman, the Small Business Committee Chair Mark Gjonaj, the Legislative Counsel Stephanie Jones, my Chief of Staff Meghan Tadio and all my colleagues for supporting this bill and I vote aye on all. Despite growing public attention, Black women in New York City are still 8 to 12 times more likely to die from pregnancy related causes than White women.

Countless scientific trials have shown that doula's have a positive impact on the well-being of the entire family. Remarkably improving physical and psychological outcomes for both mother and child. And we know from doula providers who have worked on Rikers Island previously, that the benefits of their services really do radiate outward, reaching the

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STATED MEETING OF THE NEW YORK CITY COUNCIL 65 extended family by providing [BELL RINGS]. If I may for just a half a minute?

designated for men specifically in New York.

I am asking you as my cohorts to please support my bill which will address the issue that we have.

As we fight for equity and justice, we have to look out for our men as well.

I would like to share with you all and just simply nearly one in ten men in the United States has experienced rape, physical violence and stalking by an intimate partner and reported at least one major impact related to experiences. These are other forms of other violent behavior in their relationships. If that's not appalling to you, it's just difficult for me to go on.

Colleagues, I simply am asking you and would love your support to help out our men. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you Council Member Diaz. We will next hear from Council Member Ben Kallos followed by Council Member Inez Barron followed by Council Member Ydanis Rodriguez.

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COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: As New Yorkers drift towards slumber each night, they can expect a rich echophony of noises that keep them up each night. From cars blasting bass that shakes windows as they drive by. The motorists leaning into their horns out of anger. To roving motorcycle gangs revving engines amplified by straight exhaust pipes as they speed down our sidewalks. Even trucks using a jake brake that makes the home improvement arr, arr, arr as they slow for a red light.

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The noise wouldn't be so bad on a highway park or distant vista but it's happening in neighborhoods across all five boroughs that have become destinations or drive thru with buildings that are 6, 12, even 30 stories tall, housing thousands of New Yorkers. NYPD's no chase policy has left these annoyances uncurved. New Yorkers have had enough and have come out to meetings with elected officials demanding they do something about it.

Today, we're answering their call with new legislation for automated noise enforcement using video cameras, microphone triangulation to catch the booming vehicles and mailing violations, up to \$15,000. Please sign on to Introduction 2385 to take

A very simple fix that again, many cities and states around the country have already passed and I hope it's something that we can get done here. Assembly Member Linda Rosenthal has a similar bill in the New York State assembly but it's been years that it hasn't passed. So, let's get it done. I hope other members will sign on. Thank you.

Marcus Mosiah Garvey who was born August 17, 1887.

Died June 10, 1940. He was born in Jamaica but he became a nationally recognized figure as a political activist, as a publisher and organizer and the found of the UNIA, which stands for the Universal Negro Improvement Association and African Community League. He spoke extensively about ending the colonial rule in Africa and in other parts of the world and he called for political unification of Africa.

He advocated for Blacks financial independence and he established several entities to achieve that. He had the Black star line which was both a shipping and passenger line. There were several hotels that he owned under the UNAA. There was a Black doll factory. The Black nurses unit and a millinery company as well as restaurants and a steam laundry that was operated by UNAA. He gave us the Black liberation flag, the red, black and green and his model was One God, One Aim, One Destiny. And in conclusion, his organization was worldwide and had over 200 members of grassroots people and he worked with Hubert Harrison, another significant figure in the Black history movement.
