CHAIR SIEPHEN LEVIN: Okay. Good
afternoon, everybody. Welcome to the vote on city
council's Committee on General Welfare. Today, the
committee will be voting on five Bills related to the
child welfare system in New York City. This
legislation is intended to improve accountability to
additional reporting and disclosure requirements for
the agency and empower families in the system. Our
proposed legislation consists of two Bills that I'm
sponsoring. Intro 1727 which would require ACS to
report on emergency removal cases which means the
removal of a child out of home prior to a court
hearing when during the investigation of a report of
abuse or neglect. ACS determines if such child is
not safe at home. Intro 1729 would require ACS to
provide information to parents and caretakers about
their rights to request a fair hearing, to appeal an
indicated report. Indicated is the terminology used
by child welfare agencies to denote a substantiation
of a claim. Intro 1716 by Council Member Ayala would
require additional reporting requirements by ACS
requiring emergency removal data and disaggregation
by race, community district; oh, I'm sorry, oh,

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sorry, it was written as Ayala, by Council Member Adams, and primary language of each child and parent or guardian. Intro 1717 by Council Member Ampry-Samuel would require similar reporting by ACS on race, community district, and primary language of children and parents or quardians that would every step of the child welfare system process, and Intro 1719 by Council Member Chin which would require a reporting to the council by ACS regarding how long it takes for family to reach their children after placement or transfer as well as how many children are placed outside of their home boroughs. council seeks to address the racial and economic disparities of the child welfare system. Low income black and Latino families comprise the majority of investigations conducted by ACS and 75 percent of the children in the foster care system are black and Latino while only six percent of the children in the system are white. We know that New York state is one of only seven states in addition to Washington D.C. that had the lowest standard of "some credible evidence for a case to be indicated and a parent or guardian to be put on the state central registry". This was only changed to a "fair preponderance" of

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the evidence last year. Further, New York City has a relatively high indication rate of 40 percent compared to the 20 percent nationwide. Having an indicated report of child abuse can have serious consequences, not only for a family's ability to stay together, but also for a parent or guardian's career. It is imperative that family have the information and resources that they need to appeal an indicated report of child abuse or neglect. These Bills seek to ensure that racial disparities in the child welfare system are addressed, that families in the system have the information that they need to appeal if the process was unfair or wrongly decided. I want to thank all the advocates and providers who work tirelessly to get these Bills finalized and I would also like to thank my staff, Jonathan Bushay (SP?), my chief of Staff; Elizabeth Adams (SP?), my Legislative Director; and Nicole Hunt (SP?), also a Legislative Director as well as Committee Staff, Amenta Kilowan (SP?), Senior Counsel, Crystal Poncy (SP?), a Policy Analysis, Natalie Amari (SP?), Policy Analysis, and Daniel Croop (SP?), Finance Analysis, and I'll turn it over with my apologize to Council Member Adrienne Adams to speak on her Bill 1716-A.

2	COUNCIL MEMBER ADRIENNE ADAMS: Thank you
3	so much, Chair Levin, and that's perfectly fine.
4	Thank you for allowing me to speak this afternoon
5	about my Bill that we will vote on as part of the
6	package of parental rights legislation. Intro 1716-A
7	would require the Administration for Children
8	Services to report on the total number of emergency
9	removals of children every quarter. This information
10	would be broken down by race, community, district,
11	and primary language of both the child and their
12	parent or individual legally responsible for the
13	child. This set of data is so important because we
14	know who is directly impacted by the ACS policy of
15	emergency removals. These removals that separate
16	families have such dire consequences for both the
17	child and the parent. They are traumatic, life-
18	altering events that leave families broken and torn
19	apart. Yet, from the many, many stories we've heard
20	over the years, it appears that the community's most
21	often impacted by these are low-income New Yorkers,
22	immigrants, or people of color. The child welfare
23	system overall has disproportionately impacted the
24	vulnerable and the marginalized among us but
25	requiring this detailed reporting will shine a
