2	CHAIRPERSON VALLONE: Good afternoon,
3	everyone. Welcome to the Economic Development
4	Committee at the New York City Council. Today is
5	Thursday, October 7th, 2021. My name is Paul
6	Vallone. I have the privilege of chairing this
7	committee. The purpose of today's hearing is to vote
8	on a critical piece of legislation pertaining to
9	urban agriculture in our city. Proposed Intro 1663-
10	A, sponsored by Council member Ben Kallos, would
11	establish an Office of Urban Agriculture to be housed
12	within the Office of Long Term Planning and
13	Sustainability, as well as an Urban Agricultural
14	Advisory Board comprised of various stakeholders
15	focused on urban agriculture from the worlds of
16	police, agrobusiness, land uses, advocacy, and the
17	restaurant industry. The purpose of the Office of
18	Urban Agriculture would be to promote urban
19	agriculture and establish a program to support and
20	research for advancing urban agricultural legislation
21	and policy. The Urban Agriculture Advisory Board
22	would advise city agencies on various issues relating
23	to urban agriculture in the city and submit regular
24	recommendations to the Mayor and the Speaker of the
25	City Council. This bill, when paired with proposed

1 COMMITTEE ON ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT 2 introduction 1058-A, which the Land Use Committee is 3 voting on this morning, creates a robust framework 4 for the city's urban agricultural enthusiasts and businesses and gives them a permanent voice in city government. Before I turn the floor over to the 6 7 bill's sponsor, I'd like to thank the Economic Development Committee staff, legislative counsel Alex 8 Polanov, policy analyst William Hungok [sp?], and finance analyst Aliyah Ali, as well as senior policy 10 11 analyst Nadia Johnson for all of their hard work 12 negotiating this bill. I will now turn the floor over to Council member Kallos to make some remarks on 13 14 proposed Intro 1663-A. Council member Kallos? 15 COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: I will yield to 16 Council member Mark Gjonaj and the committee clerk. 17 CHAIRPERSON VALLONE: All right. Council 18 member Gjonaj? 19 COUNCIL MEMBER GJONAJ: I vote aye. 20 CHAIRPERSON VALLONE: The clerk can Oh. 21 call the role, then. 2.2 COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: Oh. Well, then I'm 2.3 going to make my statement, if I may. CHAIRPERSON VALLONE: Yes. Please. 24

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COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: I want to thank the Economic Development Chair Vallone for his leadership on this and other food issues throughout our city.

As we live through a pandemic, we are seeing our food systems stretched to the brink and I will yield to the committee clerk once again.

CHAIRPERSON VALLONE: Can we have the clerk call the role now and then we'll give Council member Kallos a couple of minutes after the role call? Oh, just for Council member Gjonaj? Okay.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Opening role call for Council member Gjonaj. Proposed Introduction 1663-A.

COUNCIL MEMBER GJONAJ: Aye.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you, sir.

CHAIRPERSON VALLONE: Okay. Council member Kallos, you may continue.

council Member Kallos: The pandemic has shown us that our food network is not necessarily sustainable. It's been vulnerable. We've seen the price of groceries here in New York City going up and a sustainable city means a city that has its own agriculture. Urban agriculture is growing here in our city. In my district, we have funded works with

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Grow NYC to fund programming at almost every single school in the neighborhood. We have also created partnerships with NYCHA. Back in 2017, Council member Rafael Espinal, who originally introduced this bill with then borough President and still borough President for Brooklyn, Eric Adams, each set aside a million dollars for urban agriculture working with the EDC in Brooklyn. In the first term, Council member Espinal was able to force the city to launch an urban agriculture website to support urban agriculture. This is now going to actually set up an actual fully fledged Office of Urban Agriculture that will continue to maintain this website. It will work with our city's vast network of community gardens, farming at public housing, commercial farming, the Office of Food Policy, school gardens, and our organics collection services. It will also play a role in reporting and there's going to be an advisory board where we will be having young people. And I'll say I have the opportunity to meet with Dewitt Clinton-- and I'm not talking about when the kids from Dewitt Clinton would come to Bronx Science to beat us up. We were actually on the same block. got to meet with some of the newer students recently
